# Who Can Assess & Treat

Many healthcare providers may be able to diagnose and/or treat ADHD with medication or behavioral therapy. This guide illustrates the healthcare professionals who may be involved in ADHD care.

Note: Services offered by an individual provider may vary based on training, experience, and state laws.

# **Primary Care Physician (PCP)**

Most individuals will start their ADHD journey with their PCP an internist or family medicine physician, physician assistant (PA), or nurse practitioner (NP)—or your child's pediatrician.

PCPs **<u>can</u>** diagnose ADHD and prescribe and manage medication; they <u>**do not**</u> provide behavioral therapy.

# Clinical Psychologist

- <u>Can</u> provide comprehensive evaluations for ADHD and diagnose other potential co-occurring conditions, such as anxiety, depression, and learning disorders.
- <u>**Can**</u> provide behavioral therapy for ADHD.
- <u>**Do not**</u> prescribe medication for ADHD in most states.

## Other Mental Health Professional

- Social workers, licensed professional counselors, and other licensed mental health professionals (e.g., marriage and family therapists) <u>can</u> diagnose ADHD
- <u>May not</u> be able to comprehensively evaluate for other developmental or psychological disorders.
- <u>Can</u> provide behavioral therapy for ADHD, but they <u>do not</u> prescribe medication.

### Advanced Practice Psychiatric Provider (APP)

- APPs, such as physician assistants (PA) or nurse practitioners (NP), can receive specialized training in psychiatric care.
- <u>Can</u> diagnose ADHD; <u>can</u> provide ADHD medication.
- **<u>Do not</u>** provide behavioral therapy.

# Clinical Neuropsychologist

 Specialize in diagnosing brain-based conditions, such as learning disorders, and assessing specific aspects of brain functioning, such as memory and reasoning skills.





# Psychiatrist

- Specialized medical doctors who <u>can</u> diagnose ADHD as well as other psychological conditions.
- Experts in prescribing and managing psychiatric medication; <u>can</u> prescribe medicine for ADHD.
- <u>Sometimes</u> provide behavioral therapy for ADHD.

### Developmental Pediatrician

- Specialize in diagnosis and treatment of developmental and behavioral concerns.
- May be involved if questions about developmental delays, Autism Spectrum Disorder, or





- learning disabilities.
- <u>Can</u> diagnose ADHD; <u>can</u> prescribe medication.
- <u>**Do not**</u> provide behavioral therapy.
- <u>Can</u> diagnose ADHD; however, neuropsychological testing is not required for a diagnosis of ADHD.
- <u>**Do not typically**</u> provide behavioral therapy and <u>**do not**</u> prescribe medication in most states.



#### **Neurologist**

- Medical doctors who specialize in diagnosing and treating disorders of the brain and nervous systems.
- <u>Can</u> diagnose ADHD and <u>can</u> prescribe medication; but more often involved in diagnosing other brain-based conditions such as seizure disorders, Alzheimer's disease, and strokes.
- <u>**Do not**</u> provide behavioral therapy.

#### Obstetrician/ Gynecologist (OB/GYN)

- Physicians who specialize in pregnancy, childbirth, post-partum, and female reproductive health.
- <u>Can</u> prescribe and manage ADHD medication, particularly during perinatal period.
- <u>Often do not</u> diagnose ADHD and <u>do not</u> provide behavioral therapy.
